After the demise of The Racing Times Davidowitz became a freelance writer, consultant and authored Betting Thoroughbreds in the 90's to be published by E.P. Dutton-New American Library in the summer of 1995.

He moved to The Houston Post in

April to cover horse racing and handicap at Sam Houston Race Park.

Rich Burk became interested in horse racing in 1973 after attending the races at the Fair Grounds. "It was after

Burk graduated from the University of Houston with a B.A. in English and Journalism and immediately went to work for The Houston Post.

In 1986, when it appeared that pari mutuel racing was coming to Texas, Burk convinced his editor at The Houston Chronicle to allow him to cover horse racing.

He now covers Sam Houston Race Park on a daily basis and handicaps for the paper as well.

The Texas Thoroughbred Brock Sheridan, Editor

Sheridan became interested in horse racing while working with his father. Philip Sheridan, who trained Quarter Horses in Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado.

Upon graduation from the

University of Arizona with a B.S. in Business and a Race Track Industry option, he worked as a racing official in Louisiana, Washington, Colorado, Kentucky, Texas and Oklahoma.

He went to work for Louisiana Downs in 1987 and became the Director of Publicity in 1988. In 1990 Sheridan went to work for R.D. Hubbard and Brad MacKenzie in Southern California, working first as Director of Public Relations and Advertising at Los Alamitos and later at Hollywood Park as interim Director of Marketing and later Advertising Director.

In August 1993 he moved to Texas to assume his current position with The Texas Thoroughbred.

The San Antonio Express News Tim Price, Turf Writer

Price has always been a fan of horse racing, even as a young boy growing up in Irving, Texas.

Arlington with a B.A. in Liberal Arts, majoring in English.

After graduating from college, Price served a brief stint with the Sports Information Department at UT Arlington before taking a position with the San Antonio Express News in the sports department in the summer of 1986.

In 1991 Price left the Express News to become editor of The Texas Thoroughbred magazine, a position he held until May of 1993 when he returned to the San Antonio newspaper.

The Denton Record Chronicle Allen Bogan, columnist

Regarded as an expert on Texas racing history, Allen Bogan became interested in Thoroughbred racing in 1935 when he and a friend cashed a \$2 win ticket on Prince Fox, who paid \$5.80 at Arlington Downs, located between Dallas and Fort Worth.

Bogan began writing in the

1940s for the Dallas Journal but did not write his first horse racing story until 1953 when he wrote a six-part series on horse racing for the Denton Record

Chronicle, for which he had served as managing editor since 1950.

Bogan was the first editor of The Texas Thoroughbred magazine in 1960. Bogan, remained as editor, or associate editor until 1976 when he resigned. However, at least one of Bogan's articles or columns has appeared in every magazine since.

Bogan retired in 1976 but continues to write a weekly column for the Denton Record Chronicle and was named the TTBA Man Of The Year in 1983.

Daily Racing Form Steve Andersen, columnist

At age 18, Steve Andersen became interested in horse racing on May 4, 1985. "Chief's Crown (the 6-5 favorite) did not win the



Steve Anderson Kentucky Derby and I had to ask why," Andersen said.

After that, Andersen began to occasionally attend the races at Louisiana Downs while in college and working for The Dallas Morning News.

Andersen left the paper in 1989 to become Director of Publicity at Ruidoso Downs in New Mexico. Following that meeting, he went to Southern California to work in publicity at Los Alamitos Race Course. In 1990, he returned to The Dallas Morning News and stayed with the paper until June of 1991 when he was named associate editor at QuarterWeek Magazine. He eventually was promoted to editor and later began Race Arabian, a monthly magazine covering Arabian horse racing around the world.

While in Los Angeles, Andersen also wrote a weekly column for the Los Angeles Times covering Quarter Horse and Harness racing. In April of 1994, Andersen left Los Angeles to join Daily Racing Form.

Anne Lang writes a weekly column in Daily Racing Form that concentrates on Thoroughthe bred breeding industry in Texas.






